
The Challenges

We are facing a species extinction crisis, exacerbated by climate change and urbanisation. Urban land is not valued for biodiversity yet continues to be vitally important for its survival.

We continue to lose local nature and with it, connections that can support our physical, mental and spiritual wellbeing.

The majority of urban land is in private hands yet the residents managing the land are not seen and often do not see themselves as conservers of biodiversity.

Governments – (Federal, State, Local) - do not operate in a way that involves citizens in co-design of actions and policy for conserving nature.



The Opportunities

Faced with these challenges we believe a system of integrated care for nature that supports locally native species is needed; a system that extends across public and private land.

Public agencies would care for public land parks, reserves, habitat patches and wildlife corridors.

Citizens would improve habitat in their gardens through wildlife gardening to supplement this work.

Such a system needs to be sustained in a way that involves and supports citizens in co-designing and implementing actions and policy for nature stewardship.






Programs and affiliates

At the end of the year there were over 400 network members in 47 of Victoria's 79 local government areas.

Participants were exploring, developing, or operating Gardens for Wildlife programs in their areas.

Inner Metropolitan 4 of 4 LGAS


Gardens for Wildlife Victoria - supported programs are in diverse local government areas. The majority are in Greater Melbourne, with 94% of LGAs involved.

Gardens for Wildlife programs that have been endorsed as Affiliates share these key principles known to provide benefits to humans and wildlife:

- ·Designed and run by a local government community volunteer partnership
- ·Are locally sited
- ·Include face to face interaction with participants
- ·Support residents to garden for wildlife
- ·Foster social connections and wellbeing
- ·Monitor and share progress

This year three new programs affiliated: Bayside Gardens for Wildlife, Geelong Gardens for Wildlife, and Queenscliffe Gardens for Wildlife.
